Our Self-Evaluation Report and Improvement Plan 2016-17

1. Introduction

This document records the outcomes of our last improvement plan, the findings of this self-evaluation, and our current improvement plan, including targets and the actions we will implement to meet the targets.

1.1 Outcomes of our last improvement plan from [September 2015] to [May 2016] Literacy

- Students are more aware of the language that they use within the school and how appropriate/not appropriate the use of certain words/phrases are.
- Speech and language has improved with the help of a speech and language therapist (NBSS).
- Attitudes towards reading have improved through literacy week, Catch-Up Literacy and Paired Reading.
- Staff have undergone training with the NBSS and have completed courses in VEP & CatchUp Literacy.
- Key words have been expanded to all juniors.

Numeracy

- Most of the staff has included numeracy elements to their subject plans
- We have been successful with our yearly numeracy drive and we have successfully engaged 100% of our students in our Numeracy related activities in the school.

E-Learning

- We realised that we did not have the infrastructure available in order to approach the E-Learning year with any confidence.
- We began the process of looking at the infrastructure of the school in order to improve it and be prepared for the coming year and implementation of the E-Learning Year

1.2 The focus of this evaluation

We decided to improve literacy levels by improving students' attitudes towards reading in St. Vincent's during the period (September 2016) to (May 2017). We evaluated the following aspect(s) of literacy:

Literacy

- Attitude towards Reading.
- Oral language.
- Fully functional library.
- Key words at all levels.

Numeracy

- We plan to improve the numeracy and the students enjoyment of numbers through the process of SSE this year
- Continue with numeracy drive and trying to have all students in our school experience numeracy during the course of the year.
- Computation of percentages as whole school approach

Upgrade infrastructure of school in relation to E-Learning

2. Findings

2.1 This is effective / very effective practice in our school

- Students enjoyed the teachers' "A book I have read recently" posters around the school
- Most English teachers are now trained in VEP and are running the course with first year students.
- Every junior student has a key word journal and they use it regularly in all subjects.
- A buzz was created this year around oral language and presentation Senior Debating Club runs once a week during lunch time. Also a 'Public Speaking Competition' was held for all first years.





- Unfortunately the library was not accessible this academic year but by next year this facility will aid reading for enjoyment in the school.
- Paired reading between TYs and 1st years.
- Whole school approach to Spelling and Grammar Christmas and Summer exams have incorporated Spelling, Grammar and the labelling of questions into the overall grade (10%).

2.2. This is how we know

- Students were asking teachers about the books displayed on the walls which demonstrated their interest levels in reading for enjoyment.
- Both debating and the Public Speaking Competition were very successful. Students expressed their enjoyment of both aspects and want them to continue next year.
- Students and teachers felt the Paired-Reading initiative worked well and will continue next year.
- Students were encouraged to pay closer attention to spelling and grammar as they knew this would affect their grade.

2.3 This is what we are going to focus on to improve our practice further

- Encourage reading for enjoyment by using the new library and the mini-libraries within teacher-based classrooms.
- Extend practice of oral presentation by increasing the number of literacy events throughout the year for juniors Public Speaking Competition, Halloween Creative Writing Recital, Valentine's Day Poetry Reading and a Spelling Bee.
- Debating will be extended to accommodate Junior Cycle students and entry into national competitions will be encouraged.
- Spelling and grammar checklists made available to students in order for them to self-assess work.
